
WOMEN AT BUILDING ON PAST AND FUTURE GREATNESS POVERELLO HOUSE:

Women have had a significant role in the evolution of Poverello House services. It started with Mary McGarvin, who was the first volunteer at Poverello House. In 1973, she began making peanut butter and jelly sandwiches with our founder and her husband. Today, she continues to provide hospitality and kindness fifty years later. Women served as board members at Poverello House from its inception to today. Poverello House's executive team consists of dynamic women. Linda Bowman is the Chief Financial Officer. She has over 30 years of experience working with nonprofits ensuring that they remain financially viable and secure. Sara Mirhadi, Chief Programs Officer, has worked at Poverello House for 10 years. She is developing and overseeing programs that provide hope for people experiencing homelessness and addiction.

20 YEARS OF WOMEN'S SHELTER

MILESTONES WITH "MAMA MARY"

We have another anniversary that we are celebrating here at the Poverello House campus; Naomi's House is celebrating its 20th anniversary! Naomi's House was a concept that was years in the making before it became a reality in 2002. Since Mike's early days of ministry in downtown Fresno, he regularly looked for the women who came to him with their needs. The night we opened our doors in Fresno, Karen was our first client. She was a prostitute who was often unhoused and needed various supportive services. She was a Poverello House regular during most of the 1970s before we had a location for clients to sleep at. Karen is someone I often remember when thinking about unhoused women in need. Like many women we encountered at Poverello House, she struggled to have permanent housing.

Before Naomi's House came to be, Mike regularly cared for the women as much as he could. He made many trips to methadone clinics for the women who did not have the means

to get there independently. I also remember when he provided the short overnight shelter of a hotel room (with no strings attached), so these women would get a quiet place to clean up and rest. These were the little ways that Mike would try to help. Sometimes this could be seen as enabling. However, we knew we were showing them unconditional love and the dignity they deserved. We always provided whatever we could at the time, yet, we both knew there was a greater need to support women living without a home. I was very distressed over the years. As a woman who had the blessings of a home and a caring husband, I could see the needs of women on the streets that were not being met. So, having Naomi's House for the past more than twenty years has been a true blessing. We have provided overnight stable shelter to countless women and plan to continue this work as we advance.

When we opened Naomi's House, there was a gap in overnight shelters for women in the community. The Holy Cross Center for Women was

operating on our campus, providing daytime shelter and services strictly for women experiencing homelessness. Back then, we were still one year away from opening The Village of Hope, and the Women's Center was only for daytime use. I remember the support and guidance we received from Marjaree Mason Center. At the same time, as we prepared for opening, we were embarking on providing new desperately needed services. We wanted to be sure that this project would be successful. We are grateful to all those individuals and organizations who supported our needs at the time to help make sure Naomi's House was opened with a stable foundation.

I want to extend a personal thank you to all the women who have helped to keep Naomi's House running for the past twenty years. I greatly admire you all for the work you accomplish at Naomi's House. It takes a special person to take care of so many daily. We could not have made it these past 20 years without your support!
