WHERE IT ALL BEGAN-A LOOK BACK AT THE VERY FIRST 'POVERELLO NEWS'

In 1973, a man began going to Chinatown in Fresno, with peanut butter and jelly sandwiches to pass out to those on the streets. This man, Mike McGarvin, was inspired by a Franciscan priest in San Francisco that provided a safe space, coffee, and snacks to the unhoused in the Tenderloin District. Mike was lost and found himself meeting the Franciscan priest and gaining a love for service of others. Mike built rapport with anyone that passed his way and heard many types of stories from these individuals.

As Poverello House grew, he wanted to share with the community the realities of experiencing homelessness. This year, as we celebrate 50 years of serving the community, we are excited to share those archived newsletter stories. We want you to see where Poverello House started and how far the organization has come. The first newsletter sent to the community in December 1978 can be seen to the right.



The First Poverello House Newsletter Published December, 1978



Dear Friends,

December 1978

This is the first of our monthly newsletters that we will be sending out to keep you informed about the work of the Poverello. We are striving, in our small way, to carry out Jesus' command to "feed the hungry....clothe the naked....comfort the sorrowful."

Four days a week we feed the street people with soup, sandwiches and chili. This is often augmented by various donations of bread, fruits and cookies. In November, we fed 805 people on the streets. Our big Thanksgiving dinner truly blessed 231 men. We want to give our heartfelt thanks to everyone who was involved in preparing and serving the meal. It really helped the men. Also, during the month, we gave out clothing (mostly coats, jackets, pants and shoes) to 104 people.

A FEW OF THE SPECIAL PEOPLE WE HELPED LAST MONTH:

--A woman with no husband and 4 sick kids. One had pneumonia and the others colds because the heat was turned off. We paid her PG&E bill.

- --A man just out of prison. He had been so badly beaten on the head by a prison guard that the doctor had to put a plate in his head. We found him so badly beaten up again that we had to take him to the hospital. The doctors say that the plate had shifted and he has just two months to live.
- --A man with a bad infection in his leg from a beating. We took him to the hospital for medicine and got him a cane at the Sunshine Club. We've seen several cases like this--the younger guys beat up and rob the older men while they're sleeping.

--A woman who is 50ish and lives in one of the hotels always brings her bowl down for some soup and is very appreciative for our help and caring.

- --A World War II vet who lost a leg. He now has an infection in his other leg from a beating. He has to go to Veterans' Hospital for amputation.
- --A man from Washington, 4 kids, car broke down and no housing. We gave him food and gas to help out temporarily and took them to Catholic Charities for further help.
- --A man almost killed several times by beatings. We gave him a bus ticket to Bakersfield where he has friends and hopes of employment.
- --A woman without her children due to drug abuse. We have counseled and helped her for several months. Because she's been "clean" for quite awhile, we were able to take her to pick up her kids at their foster homes for the holidays. She was very happy as she hadn't had them for 8 months.

These are just a few examples of a typical month of our street ministry. This is why our work must continue. Again we thank you for helping to make our work possible with your donations of money, food and clothing.
